Junior Fair Board Awards

Two awards will be given to two Junior Fair Board members who demonstrate outstanding service and leadership to the Junior Fair. Selection will be made by a vote of the entire membership of the current Junior Fair Board.

JUNIOR FAIR ORGANIZATIONS

4-H

4-H is a voluntary, educational program designed to meet the needs and interests of all boys and girls. Project members are at least age 8 years old and enrolled in 3rd grade as of January 1 of the current year. Clover buds are part of the noncompetitive programs. They are youth at least 5 years old and in kindergarten through 8 years old and in the second grade. Ohio 4-H memberships ends December 31 of the year in which an individual attains the age of 19. Membership begins when an eligible individual is enrolled in a club or group that is under the direction of a trained adult and within the scope of Ohio State University Extension. The purpose of 4-H is to provide learning experiences and opportunities for boys and girls which will help them grow and develop to the fullest of their potential.

FFA

FFA is a National Organization of young people studying Vocational Agriculture in public schools in the 50 states and Puerto Rico. This organization of and for students in Vocational Agriculture in public schools in Ohio and the nation has been in progress for over 85 years. An integral part of the program of vocational education in agriculture in the public school system of America, the FFA has become well known. Organized in November of 1928 it has served to motivate and vitalize the systematic instruction offered to students of Vocational Agriculture and to provide further training in rural citizenship. The FFA is an intra-curricular activity, having its origin and root in a definite part of the school curriculum. Vocational Agriculture members among other things, learn through active participation, how to conduct, and take part in a public meeting, to speak in public, to buy and sell cooperatively, to solve their own problems, to finance themselves and to assume civic responsibility.

Boy Scouts

Boy Scouts of America by forming "partnerships" with community organizations serve youth and families. Cub Scouting (first through fifth grades) – "Fun with a Purpose." Under adult leadership, the Cub Scout learns cooperation at home and in the community. Boy Scouting (ages 11 through 17) – "Learning by Doing." Boy Scouting promotes personal fitness, character, development, and good citizenship. Exploring (co-ed age 15 through 20) – "Adult-like Activities." Explores with adult guidance planned activities that promote responsibility, leadership, social awareness, career exploration, personal fitness, outdoor fun, and service to others.

Girl Scouts

Girl Scouts is an organization providing various programs for youth through high school. These youth advance through individual troops which include educational and creative activities, community and service programs, and local and state participation, communication skills focusing on the development of mature young adults.

FCCLA

The Goal of Family Career Community Leaders of America is to help youth assume their roles in society through home economics education in the areas of personal growth, family life, vocational preparation, and community involvement. This stated goal is the same for vocational home economics programs and the student organization: thus Family Career Community Leaders of America is a co-curricular rather than an extra-curricular activity. As such, Family Career Community Leaders of America has a definite role in the curriculum through in-class and extended class activities. Integration of Family Career Community Leaders of America into the curriculum is the responsibility of the home economics teachers, local and state home economics supervisors and teacher-educators.

LOGAN COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR BOARD CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article I – Name

Section 1.

The name of the organization shall be the Logan County Junior Fair Board and shall hereafter be known as the Junior Fair Board.

Article II – Purpose

Section 1.

The purpose of the Junior Fair Board shall be to encourage youth work in the county through year round activities and to promote participation at the Logan County Fair.

Article III – Membership and Organization

Section 1.

The members shall be selected by submitting a completed Junior Fair Board Application form. Each applicant must be a member of a Logan County Junior Fair organization. Acceptance and membership to the board is an agreement to complete the rules and responsibilities of the Junior Fair Board.

Section 2.

At the time of selection and during the term of office each Junior Fair Board member must be actively enrolled in one (1) or more Junior Fair organization: 4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, or FCCLA.

Section 3.

The member must be entering Freshman, Sophomore, or Junior year at the time of selection for their First Term.

Section 4.

First Term members shall serve a twelve (12) month term beginning in October as a Junior Fair Board Ambassador. Junior Fair Board Ambassadors may reapply for a Second Term once they have completed their twelve (12) month term successfully. Approved Second Term members shall serve a twenty-four (24) month term beginning in October as a Junior Fair Board Member. A Third Term of twenty-four (24) months could also be served by those members who are eligible their Senior year or are eligible after high school but are still within 4-H age.

Section 5.

A formal application for membership from each applicant must be submitted to the OSU Extension Office or the Senior Fair Board Office by September 30th. A committee of the Junior Fair Board Advisors and one Junior Fair Board member will make up the Junior Fair Board Selection Committee. The Selection Committee will conduct interviews and either approve or disapprove applicants in October.

Section 6.

All members must attend all regular and special meetings of

the Junior Fair Board and have 20 hours' worth of Junior Fair Board work days prior to the Fair and 20 hours during Fair. Any member missing two (2) meetings unexcused by the Junior Fair Board Advisors shall have their name placed before the Junior Fair Board for a discussion of removal from the board. After two missed meetings (excused or unexcused) time must be made up to the Junior Fair Board Advisors at one hour per missed meeting.

Section 7.

Meetings shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

Article IV – Officers

Section 1.

Officers of the Junior Fair Board shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, and Reporter. Any person nominated shall have served on the Junior Fair Board at least one (1) year. Officers shall be selected by Secret Ballot with the nominee(s) dismissed from the voting. Only persons in attendance and at the meeting may be elected to an office. The meeting for re-organization shall be held after the closing of the annual Fair and before the new term starts.

Article V – General Rules

Section 1.

Representatives of the Junior Fair Board may attend the Annual Fair Managers Convention as delegates from the Logan County Fair Board.

Section 2.

Management of the Junior Fair shall be the responsibility of the Junior Fair Advisors, the Junior Fair Board, and are subject to the approval of the Senior Fair Board.

LOGAN COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS ELIGIBILITY AND ENTRIES

Section 1.

All exhibitors in the Logan County Junior Fair must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade, and no older than 18 as of January 1st, current year. They must be regularly enrolled members of an FFA/Agricultural Education Department, FCCLA/Home Economics Department, Art Department, and Industrial Arts/Technology Department of Indian Lake, Riverside, Benjamin Logan, Bellefontaine City Schools and West Liberty-Salem, whose students live in Logan County, or a Logan County 4-H Club, or a Boy Scout, Girl Scout Troop. Exhibits may only be made in the area and class that pertains to the project carried.

Section 2.

No Junior Fair exhibitor may exhibit the same project through different youth organizations. If an exhibitor participates at the Logan County Junior Fair and wishes to participate in another county's Junior Fair, separate and different projects must be

exhibited, and they must be representing a different youth organization. Both counties must be notified that a youth is participating in more than one Junior Fair. When an exhibitor belongs to more than one youth organization within Logan County, projects carried in all cases, must be separate and different (also different animals and/or products) in an effort to broaden the exhibitors experience and learning.

Section 3.

Junior Fair entries are due on or by.

December – 2nd Saturday

Market Heifers, Market Steer (T-Bone & Dairy)

May 1

Swine, Market Lambs, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, & Beef Breeding

May – 2nd Saturday

Dairy Feeder & Beef Feeder

June 3

Breeding Sheep, Dairy Cattle, Horses & Ponies

LATE ENTRIES

Section 4.

Late entries for Junior Fair will be charged \$200 up to 7 days after the deadline. On the 8th day after the deadline, Junior Fair Entries will not be accepted for the 2019 Logan County Fair.

LIVESTOCK TAGGING & OWNERSHIP

Section 5.

Livestock must have ownership on or by the following dates:

December 1

Beef Steers, Market Heifers, Dairy Steers

May 1

Beef Feeder Calves, Dairy Feeder, Dairy Cattle, Swine, Market Lambs, Horses & Ponies, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Market Turkey, Beef Breeding

May 20

Breeding Sheep

Section 6.

The following animals must be properly tagged or identified on or by the following date:

December – 2nd Saturday

Market Heifers, Market Steer T-Bone & Dairy

May 1

Swine, Market Lambs, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, & Beef Breeding, Market Lambs, Horses & Ponies

May – 2nd Saturday

Dairy Feeder & Beef Feeder

June 1

Breeding Sheep, Dairy Cattle

July 6

Rabbits (at weigh-in)

Section 7.

Junior Fair exhibitors may choose Family Tagging for Junior Fair market animal projects. The maximum number of market

animals per exhibitor can be tagged as family animals.

Family animals must be tagged, forms completed and turned in by the species tagging deadline. Family animals are eligible to be shown by any exhibitor in the family. Families are defined as exhibitors that share the same address on record a Junior Fair organization. Specific animals will be identified to specific exhibitors at a time before weigh-in to be determined. See department for additional rules and information.

QUALITY ASSURANCE & LIVESTOCK HEALTH

Section 8.

All Junior Fair livestock exhibitors must attend any Quality Assurance Workshop on an annual basis, unless they tested out per their age bracket. An exhibitor may pass a test based on the appropriate skill level for their age (12-14 or 15-18). This option is open to a member who is 12 years old (as of January 1 of current year) and/or not a first-time exhibitor. Exhibitors must score 70% or better to qualify. Test out is valid until the exhibitor reaches the age of 15 at which time the exhibitor must attend a Quality Assurance Workshop annually again or test out for the 15-18 age bracket. A parent or guardian is required to attend a Quality Assurance Workshop with the Junior Fair Exhibitor if they are a first-year exhibitor, regardless of age. An exhibitor may attend a certified Quality Assurance program out of county, as long as a certificate is on file at the Extension Office or Senior Fair Board Office by 4:30 pm on May 1, current year. Late certificates will be charged \$200 up to 7 days after the deadline. On the 8th day after the deadline, Quality Assurance certificates will not be accepted and the exhibitor will not be eligible for the Logan County Fair.

Section 9.

A Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) and FDA feed forms must be submitted at weigh in for each market and lactating animal. One (1) form equals one (1) animal. No form, no weigh-in and the exhibitor will be ineligible for exhibition. A Junior Fair livestock exhibitor's project must be drug free when they come into the Fairgrounds to be eligible to participate and sell in the Logan County Junior Fair Livestock Sale. If drugs are determined to be present, the exhibitor and/or exhibitor's family may be banned from showing in any future Logan County Fairs. The minimum number of years for banning is three (3) years before the right to review.

Section 10.

All livestock placed on exhibit are subject to official Health Regulations of the Veterinary Department of the State Department of Agriculture. **All Junior Fair Livestock Exhibitors must follow Ohio Livestock Health Exhibition Rules.**

Section 11.

All Junior Fair Exhibitors must be responsible for care, feeding and handling of livestock exhibits. All exhibitors are responsible for their own veterinary costs. Logan County Agricultural Society is not responsible for health or death of a sick animal before, during, or after the Fair.

Section 12.

Animals will be checked by the Fair veterinarians in their designated area after their respective weigh in times. (all sheep/goat blankets need to be removed by 7:15 pm for inspection). The Fair Veterinarian has the responsibility to enforce the laws of Ohio and the regulations and rules of the Division of Animal Industry of the Dept. of Agriculture of Ohio, which pertain to livestock exhibited at the Fair. He/she shall inspect the livestock entries and necessary health certificates for evidence of infectious disease and shall carry out the recommendations of Ohio to protect the health of livestock exhibited at the Fair.

Section 13.

Any exhibitor giving their animal(s) medication(s) or any drugs must have Fair veterinarian approval before being given. The Fair vet or your vet working with the Fair vet will make a decision as to the drug being given, who by, and for what purpose and put it in writing to the Senior Fair Office. Failure to comply will result in awards being forfeited and can result in disqualification.

Section 14.

If a Fair veterinarian determines that an animal requires veterinary care, it will be administered at the EXHIBITOR'S EXPENSE. Authorization of release of Sick Animal will be determined by the Department Superintendent, the Fair veterinarian, Senior Fair Board, and the Sale Committee and a release form must be signed by all parties.

WEIGH-INS & CHECK-IN**Section 15.**

The weight of all livestock at initial weigh in will be the sale weight. All weigh-ins will occur on Saturday, July 6th,
 9:00-2:00pm – Poultry
 3:00-4:00pm – Poultry Meat Pens, Rabbit Meat Pens
 4:00-7:00pm – Swine
 4:00-7:00pm – Dairy Feeders, Beef Steers, Market Heifers, Beef Feeders, and Dairy Steers
 5:00-6:00pm – Market Goats
 6:00-7:00pm – Market Lambs
 7:00-7:30pm – Market Lambs & Market Goats
 7:00-8:00pm – Market Turkey

Section 16.

The following entries must be in place at the Logan County Fairgrounds by the following dates and times:

All exhibits in the 4-H Building must be in place by 2:00pm Saturday prior to the opening of the fair.

All Junior Fair Livestock animals must be in place by 2:00pm Saturday prior to the opening of the fair.

Section 17.

Once projects are placed they may not be replaced for any reason without the authority of the Senior Fair Board Director.

EXHIBITING**Section 18.**

Junior Fair Exhibitors must show their own projects and animals. The committee will consider hardship cases. If substitute showmen are needed, the Senior Fair Board must approve the extra showman.

Section 19.

In cases where the Junior Fair Exhibitor has more than one (1) animal in the same class the handler must be a Logan County Junior Fair Exhibitor. If a person has two animals that fall into the same weight class, the heavier of the two animals may be bumped up to the next heavier weight class. Talk to the superintendent of your department.

Section 20.

Exhibitors may not share or change animals with relative's/family members nor can animals be replaced or substituted for any reason. The projects that you declare/enter during the enrollment period must be the project(s) that are shown. Each family member must show different animals and/or projects.

Section 21.

Animals used in showmanship classes must be the contestant's own project exhibited in the Junior Fair of the current year.

TAMPERING / MISREPRESENTATION

To maintain a high degree of confidence in the livestock shows, the Logan County Junior and Senior Fair Boards, reserve the right to disqualify any animals that have been tampered or misrepresented in an unethical manner. Unethical tampering as described by the Ohio Department of Agriculture include:

Section 22.

1. Applying any electrical, mechanical or other appliance to livestock repeatedly or for a prolonged time period in violation of section 313.2 of the United States code of federal regulations.

2. Hitting, striking, beating or otherwise impacting livestock that induces swelling or enhances, transform or changes the true conformation, configuration or appearance of the livestock.
3. Plugging or sealing of teats using unapproved substances or for longer than eighteen hours using approved substances.
4. Injecting material into udders or teats for non-medical purposes or otherwise artificially modifying the appearance or conformation of the udder or teat.
5. Using ice, ice packs, cold packs or cold compresses internally or externally other than in accordance with paragraph (S) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code.
6. The use of a stomach tube or pump for any purpose other than for the relief of tympany or gas is prohibited.
7. The drenching (the act of using an instrument (including a bottle, syringe, scoop, or your hand) placed in the animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance) of any livestock at an exhibition is prohibited.
8. The removal of tissue, use of ice water, enemas, ice packing, electrical shock, pumping or tabbing (cattle), syringe feeding (lambs), excessive bracing (lambs), and excessive trimming of the sole and wall of the hoof (ponies), any injection of gas, solid or liquid, also cutting or tearing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal in accordance with paragraph (S) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code
9. Attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development as well as the dyeing or coloring of the individuals, which alter their natural coloration.
10. Artificial tail heads or rolls.
11. Any attempts to change the degree of firmness of any animals shall also be considered unethical.

Any premiums, trophies, awards or sale money won by an exhibitor found tampering or misrepresenting will be withheld or returned to the Senior and Junior Fair Boards. The exhibitor(s) and/or exhibitor's family may be barred from showing at any future Logan County Fairs.

STALL/HOUSING

Section 23.

All exhibits must be in place by their designated times and in the space designated by those in charge. Special requests for livestock stall assignments should be made to Department Superintendent and be requested by June 1st. Animals cannot be moved from assigned stall unless permission granted by Department Superintendent and Department Committee. (See Department rules for specific times and other information).

Section 24.

Exhibitors must keep their exhibits, pens, stalls and aisles in the area of their exhibits(s) clean and neat, at all times, until animals are released. Inspections will be planned at a time or times established by the Department Superintendents and/or committee department members. All pens must be cleaned by 10:00am daily.

Section 25.

All feed and bedding for livestock must be furnished by the exhibitor.

Section 26.

Exhibitors are required to clean out their pen(s) on Sunday, following the removal of their animal(s). Failure to do so could result in exhibitor's inability to participate in following years Fair.

Section 27.

All animals must be fastened securely with good strong halters or in pens. Cattle must be double tied (neck collar and halter).

PENALTIES

Section 28.

No person shall be allowed to exhibit in the Logan County Junior Fair who has been banned for disciplinary or other similar reasons from another county, independent or state Fair for a period commensurate with the ban.

Section 29.

Any Junior Fair exhibitors having a part in conduct bringing disgrace upon the Junior Fair will automatically forfeit all awards, trophies, sale money and may face further punitive action.

Section 30.

All exhibitors must abide by the rules of the Logan County Fair or will be asked to leave the grounds.

Section 31.

All violations in relation to the Junior Fair, which may happen before, during, or after the Logan County Fair, will be heard and considered at a time designated by the Senior and Junior Fair Board. Senior Fair Board rulings are final.

Section 32.

No person is to interfere with the judging or assist persons giving demonstrations, showing livestock or being interviewed. Prompting by parents or other individuals with hand signals, facial expressions, eye movements, or any other signal system will be grounds for disqualification from the show. Violations of this rule will warrant withholding of awards, premiums and disqualification from participating with this animal in the livestock sale.

Section 33.

Each department committees and Fair official will expect courteous and orderly conduct by the exhibitors, parents, attendants and others. Harassment, profanity or unsportsmanlike conduct toward Fair officials (Senior or Junior Fair), judges, or superintendents will not be tolerated. Any violations of this rule will warrant withholding of awards, premiums and said exhibitor and their exhibits will be sent home not to return during the current Fair or possible future Fairs.

Section 34.

A judge's decision on how an exhibitor places in a class cannot be protested.

Section 35.

In the question of a rule violation, the following process will be used. The Department Committee or Superintendent will question the exhibitor and/or parties involved. If it is felt an attempt to defraud the Logan County Fair / Logan County Agriculture Society or a rule violation has been made, the matter will be taken before the Senior Fair Board Executive Committee. The Senior Fair Board Executive Committee will make a ruling. The exhibitor and/or exhibitor's family may be barred from showing in any future Logan County Fairs. When any exhibitor has been awarded premiums, trophies, awards, ribbons or sale money, they must refund any or all the above.

Section 36.

Appeals must be made in writing and signed within 24 hours from the end of the protested show/program. A one-hundred dollar (\$100.00) fee must accompany the appeal and is non-refundable. This fee will go for Junior Fair improvements. In all cases, selected members of the Senior Fair Board will be involved to enforce the Junior Fair rules. The appeal process is designed to allow anyone that is in violation of a rule due process. After the appeal is received, the violator will receive written notification and will have the opportunity to be heard and all parties involved having the right to present their case with private retained counsel if desired before the committee renders a decision and penalty. A hearing will then be considered at a time designated by Senior Fair Board. Senior Fair Board rulings are final.

Section 37.

The Senior Fair Board, the Junior Fair Board and/or the Department Committees reserve the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard there to, or otherwise arising out of connected with or incident to the Logan County Fair and the Junior Fair. They further reserve the right to determine unforeseen matters not covered by these rules, to amend or add to these rules as in its judgment it may determine and to withdraw all premium offerings and awards in all departments should any circumstances demand it.

Section 38.

Junior Fair Department Committees have the authority to make necessary changes within their Department as the need arises. This includes changes in rules, classes, class size, etc. Changes are due by December 1st of the year prior to the Fair. They may however reserve the right, if need arises, to change a rule in an emergency situation after December 1st.

RELEASE**Section 39.**

Exhibits are released only upon permission of Senior Fair Department Committees/Fair Vet. All livestock projects may be removed after 11:59pm on Saturday, July 13 except for poultry and rabbits will release between 6:00am -9:00am on Sunday, July 14. All other projects including booths will be release on Sunday, July 14, between 8:00am – 6:00pm.

Section 40.

Once animals are on grounds, have went thru weigh-in, vet check, or any other required procedures and met the requirements to show, they must stay on the grounds for the week of Fair. An animal project may only leave upon permission from the Fair vet, committee member or director in charge of the species.

PREMIUMS**Section 41.**

There will be no premiums paid in 2019.

*The Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee has the right to change or modify the sale order, if needed.

Section 2.

Junior Fair livestock sale exhibitors will be permitted to sell up to two (2) market animals, providing they are from two different departments. The Senior Fair Board will attempt to make arrangements for those animals that don't go through the sale ring to participate in the Base Bid process. If we receive no base bid for chickens and turkeys, it will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to take the animal(s) home. All Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals must be sold through the livestock sale (See department rules for exceptions). Grand and Reserve Grand Champion sale animals will count as one time through the sale. If you have any questions, contact the Sale Committee. There is no replacement policy for animals.

Section 3.

Junior Fair livestock exhibitors must decide by the end of their livestock show which animal goes through the sale, goes through the base bid process or will be taken home. Animals that have not been designated by Thursday at 9:00am (with exception of goats - see department for specific guidelines) will be sent through as a base bid animal. Release forms must be turned into the Junior Fair office.

Section 4.

The Grand and Reserve Grand Champion steer, lamb, hog, goat must sell and be slaughtered. Dairy Feeders are not required to sell. Beef Feeders will not sell. The Grand and Reserve Grand Champions will be processed by a facility chosen by the Senior Fair board.

Section 5.

All rabbit meat pens going through the livestock sale must be consigned, if the buyer doesn't want the animals. The project may not be removed by the exhibitor or their family or taken home. These animals cannot be shown at any other Fair and

may not be used as a breeding project at next year's Fair.

Section 6.

The ordinary rules of auction sales will apply. Members of immediate families should not bid. (Immediate family members are considered: parents, brothers, sisters (includes step) or guardians of exhibitors).

Section 7.

Exhibitors WILL NOT approach buyers at the Livestock Sale asking them to buy their animal. If an exhibitor does, there will be a \$50.00 fine, which will be taken directly out of your livestock sale check. It is acceptable for exhibitors to approach the buyers to THANK YOU once the animal has sold. If items of appreciation are to be given to the buyer (such as cookies, etc.) those need to be given to the buyer after the exhibitor leaves the sale ring.

Section 8.

The Buyer Group Cards are for BUYERS ONLY to be used when putting a group of buyers together. Junior Fair exhibitors are not permitted to have these cards and are not permitted to approach a buyer at the sale and ask them to "give money/put money on their project". Parents may utilize these cards if they are business owners participating as buyers at the sale.

Section 9.

Expense of the sale will be determined prior to Fair. Some expense will be collected from each seller. Senior Fair Board will deduct this charge from the sale price in 2019:

1. Three percent (3%) of the total sale amount will be deducted from each animal sold, and for each animal sold at the base bid for an exhibitor. The first 2% will be used to cover expenses of the Livestock Sale. The additional 1% will be used for improvements of the livestock barns and/or show arena in which market animals are housed/shown.
2. A deduction of one dollar per head for Market Steers and Dairy Steers will be made for the Ohio Beef Marketing Program and one dollar per head for the Federal Beef Check-off Program.
3. A deduction of .0040 of the sale-value for Market Hogs will be made for the Ohio Pork Producers promotion programs.
4. A deduction of ½ of 1 percent (.0050) of the sale value for Market Lambs will be made for the Ohio Sheep Check-off Program.

Section 10.

Minimum bid for sale is \$25.00 per animal.

Section 11.

All sale animals must be released by a member of the Department Committee before an animal can be removed from the Fairgrounds. A copy of the Buyers Invoice must be presented before an animal will be released. Violations of the

rule must follow Ohio Livestock Health Exhibition Rules.

Section 12.

The sale animals will be released to livestock buyers and haulers, times to be determined by the Senior Fair Board. Once released, the buyers are responsible for their animal(s). The exhibitor is responsible for the livestock up until this time.

Section 13.

All livestock buyers need to indicate to the ring personnel how they want their livestock handled. It is important that you decide what is to be done with the animal you bid on, whether you wish to purchase it for processing or your own use or consigned (reselling to market and used for advertising purposes). All animals that are consigned go to the base bidder. If you choose to have it processed, we'll need to know where. We need to know where your animal is going when you are the final bidder on an animal.

Section 14.

If a buyer is approached to sell back or trade an animal(s), the buyer must report this information to the Livestock Sale Committee Chairman and the information will be directed to the Ohio State Fair Commission. All animals that have been consigned or sold through the auction or any other type transaction are not eligible to show at the Ohio State Fair-Junior Division or any other future Logan County Junior Fair Shows. This includes animals that have been bought back by the exhibitor. Violations of this rule will warrant the exemption of showing at the Logan County Junior Fair or future Logan County Fairs. (See department rules for additional requirements).

Section 15.

Animals that are sold through the livestock sale cannot be returned to the exhibitor.

Section 16.

If the carcass of an animal is condemned at the packing plant for any reason, that shall be grounds for disqualification. Additionally, sale money shall be forfeited, and the exhibitor will incur the loss of the animal.

Section 17.

Livestock sale checks **must be cashed within 90 days** from the issue date. Failure to cash checks will result in the total value being absorbed into the Livestock Sale Account.

DAIRY FEEDER BASE BID SALE

Section 18.

The Dairy Committee will have a separate base bid auction for the Dairy Feeders on Thursday. If a buyer wants to purchase the animal, they will need to do so at this sale. Exhibitors may sell one calf in the sale on Friday for Premium amount.

1. Base bid will be determined by an auction of DF exhibitors wishing to sell. Each calf will receive its own

bid.

2. Exhibitors will determine one of three options: (1) Take Home; (2) Premium Sale which includes the DF Base Bid Sale; (3) Base Bid Sale only, by using an Animal Destination Form.
3. The base bid will be more competitive with actual DF market prices at the time.
4. Exhibitors will be able to go through Junior Fair livestock sale to receive their premium bid.
5. Base bid will be added to the premium price.
6. Buyers of DF through the Junior Fair livestock sale will pay the premium bid.
7. Individuals who wish to purchase a DF to retain ownership will need to do so at the DF base bid sale. Exhibitors who show two calves can base bid both calves if they desire.

JUNIOR FAIR ROYALTY

General Rules

1. Applications are available at OSU Extension's website: www.logan.osu.edu and the Logan County Fair website: www.logancountyfair.org.
2. All applications are due to the Fair Office.
3. Candidates must be a Logan County Junior Fair Exhibitor of the current year.
4. All ages are based on age at January 1st, current year.
5. Candidates must be unmarried nor has ever been married or pregnant nor has ever been pregnant, fathered a child, or adoptive parent of a child.
6. Must be in high school or have graduated from high school.
7. May not use or consume illegal controlled substances or alcohol.
8. Candidate must participate or be eligible to participate in Logan County Junior Fair activities.
9. Never have been convicted of criminal offense or have criminal charges pending.
10. Be committed to the role you are chosen for one full year.
11. Shall waive liability and hold the Logan County Fair and its officials, 4-H, and OSU Extension and its officials harmless in the event of any injury occurring during participation.
12. All candidates are required to abide by the Expectations of Fair Royalty with possible disqualifications for infractions of those duties conducting him/her in an improper manner.
13. Royalty must attend Fair events including Opening Ceremony, Awards Ceremony and livestock shows for the species they represent.
14. Royalty must participate in parades and other activities in the County after Fair.
15. It is expected that Royalty visit other County Fairs

JUNIOR FAIR ROYALTY

1. Open to any Junior Fair exhibitor based on age.
 - a. King & Queen candidates must be age 16-19.
 - b. Prince & Princess candidates must age 11-15
2. Candidate must attend a meeting prior to interviews (date, time & location TBD). Contact Fair office for more details.
3. Candidate must participate in a preliminary interview on June 23. Candidates will be contacted with details of interview times and location.
4. Candidate shall never have been a previous Logan County Fair King or Queen/Prince or Princess.
5. Applications are due by June 1st. No late applications.

BEEF AMBASSADOR

1. Contestants must live on a farm where cattle (beef) are produced, or parents must derive part of their income from the production of cattle/beef, or they must have a beef project in Junior Fair.
2. Contestants must be age 16-19.
3. Applications are due by May 1st.

DAIRY AMBASSADOR

1. Application is open to any dairy exhibitor age 14 and older.
2. Application is due by June 1st

PIG AMBASSADORS

1. Application is open to any swine exhibitor based on age
 - a. Senior age 14- 19.
 - b. Junior age 8 - 13
2. Application is due by June 1st
3. Ambassadors must work at least one (1) shift in the Lamb & Pork booth with your own crew.

SHEEP QUEEN & PRINCESS

1. Open to female sheep exhibitors based on age
 - a. Queen – age 14 -19
 - b. Princess – age 8 – 13
2. Application is due by February 1st.
3. Applicants must attend Logan County Sheep Banquet the first Thursday of March so that you may be crowned.
4. Work at least one (1) shift in the Lamb & Pork Booth with your own crew.
5. Work one (1) day at the Drive It Yourself Ag Tour.

GOAT AMBASSADORS

1. Applicants must be a Junior Fair goat exhibitor.
 - a. Senior age 14-19.
 - b. Junior age 8-13.
2. Applications are due by June 1st.
3. A current picture must be included with the application

POULTRY AMBASSADORS

1. Open to Junior Fair poultry exhibitor based on age.
 - a. Senior - 14-19
 - b. Junior – 9 -13
2. Application is due by June 1st.

RABBIT AMBASSADORS

1. Open to Junior Fair rabbit exhibitors based on age.
 - a. Senior - 14 -18
 - b. Junior – 8 – 13
2. Application is due June 1st.

General Rules

1. All Junior Fair Senior Showmanship Division winners from each of the following Departments: One per department - T-Bone Steers, Dairy, Dairy Feeder, Goat, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep and Swine Departments are eligible to compete. Department Superintendent and committee will determine how their Senior age participant is selected. Dairy and Poultry must determine one representative for the entire department.
2. Dress for the contest should reflect proper and appropriate show ring apparel for the specific species represented. Logan County Fair Livestock Grooming Rules apply to all species.
3. Should one contestant have won two Senior Showmanship Divisions, they must decide which specie they choose to represent with the runner-up in the other division taking their place.
4. Should someone be unable to participate, the runner-up will show. It is the responsibility of the winner to notify the runner-up of their opportunity.
5. The contest participants will provide the animal in which they won showmanship with for the competition.
6. Contestants will be asked to rotate to different species every four minutes.
7. Each judge will rate the participants on a scale of one (1) to ten (10), with ten being the best. The highest cumulative score will win the contest.
8. Calculating the deviation in the contestant's scores will break a tie. The highest score will be subtracted from the lowest score, yielding the deviation in the contestant's scores. If a tie still exists, nine questions, one each of species in the event, will be asked to the contestants who are tied to determine the winner.
9. A suitable representative or representatives chosen by the Logan County Agricultural Education Instructors will judge each division.
10. An exhibitor may win the Showman of Showman contest only one time during their Junior Fair Career.
11. The winner will receive a traveling Showman of Showmen trophy in which he/she will be responsible to have engraved and brought back for the following year.

ENTRY & TAGGING INFORMATION

1. An entry form is required for eligibility at the Logan County Fair. Entry forms are available on the Logan County OSU Extension website at logan.osu.edu or online at logancountyFair.Fairentry.com.
2. Entry forms are due for:
 - a. Beef Steers, Market Heifers, and Dairy Steers
At tagging the 2nd Saturday of December
 - b. Beef Breeding
May 1st to the Extension Office
 - c. Beef Feeder Calves
At tagging the 2nd Saturday of May
3. Beef Steers, Market Heifers and Dairy Steers must be ear tagged on the 2nd Saturday of December in order to be eligible for Fair (EID's are acceptable and will be verified on this date). Tagging will be held at the Fairgrounds between 8:30am – 10:30am. Animals that are planning to be shown at the BEST Program show scheduled for this date must show proof of attendance in order to be tagged at a later date and location.
4. Feeder Calves will be tagged on the 2nd Saturday of May at the Fairgrounds between 8:30-10:30am. This tagging is mandatory to be eligible for Fair.
5. If an animal loses its ear tag after tagging, the exhibitor will need to immediately notify Beef Committee to receive a new tag. If a lost tag is not reported and/or replaced by a member of the Beef Committee, the animal will be ineligible to exhibit/.
6. Animals that do not meet their minimum/maximum weights will be sent home; no re-weighs.
7. No animal or exhibitor substitution is permitted once animals have been weighed.
8. Classes are broken by weights. If an exhibitor has two animals in the same class, they may have another Junior Fair exhibitor show their animal. Animals will not be moved to another class to accommodate the exhibitor.

GENERAL RULES

1. Exhibitors showing a Beef Steer, Market Heifer, or Dairy Steer may tag up to (3) animals in any combination of the three (3) species.
2. Calves must be cleanly and properly dehorned to the crown prior to Fair and preferably prior to tagging.
3. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation shall be considered fraud and deception. Exhibitors may not do the following: lifting and filling under the skin, use string, artificial tail head, alter natural color, force feed, and any other practice deemed fraudulent by the committee. Violations will make the animal ineligible to show/sell and will be sent home. Should violations be discovered after sale, all sale money will be returned to the buyer and the animal or carcass shall be returned to the exhibitor at the expense of the exhibitor.
4. Once animals have arrived on grounds, passed vet check and weigh in, they are not permitted to leave grounds until the scheduled release established, without permission of the Beef Committee
5. Animals registered for the Ohio State Fair will be permitted to leave grounds prior to regularly scheduled time but after the Junior Fair Beef Show; release will be after 10:00pm. Verification of registration must be provided to the Beef Committee in order to be given permission to leave grounds.
6. Animals must be in the barn by 10:00am daily. Animals will be permitted to be tied outside of the barn after 9:00pm, if exhibitors wish to do so.
7. Animals are not permitted to be tied out near or next to the roadway or using the perimeter fencing on grounds.
8. Kickboards are required for each stall.
9. No couches, overstuffed chairs, etc. allowed in or around the barn.
10. No porta-coolers or air conditioning units allowed.
11. All barn decorations and miscellaneous items must be removed from the barn after Fair.
12. No nose rings.

BEEF SHOW GUIDELINES & DRESS CODE

1. Exhibitors are required to wear long pants or jeans.
2. A collared shirt must be long enough to tuck in and stay tucked in at all times.
3. Shirts must be a button up or polo type shirt and may only have the top two buttons unbuttoned.
4. Shoe strings to be tied.
5. No hats worn in the show/sale ring.
6. Dress code and personal appearance is at the discretion of the Beef Committee Failure to comply with this code may result in disqualification.

OHIO STATE FAIR INFORMATION

1. Beef steers to be shown at the Ohio State Fair must be in exhibitors' possession by January 1st.
2. All entry information, including deadlines can be found at www.ohiostateFair.com
3. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to know the Ohio State Fair rules/guidelines for entry and exhibition.

BEEF SHOWMANSHIP

1. Open to Beef Steer, Market Heifer, Beef Feeder, and Beef Breeding exhibitors.
2. Showmanship will be broken by ages:
 - a. Junior age 8 -14
 - b. Senior age 15-19
3. Junior Showmanship winner must advance to Senior Showmanship, regardless of age the following year.

Division 001: BEEF STEERS

1. Steers must be castrated by using mechanical or surgical means or must be certified by a Veterinarian and approved by the Fair Vet that the calf is a steer. Castration must be completed by tagging in December or calf is ineligible to exhibit at Fair.
2. Exhibitor must have steer in possession by December 1st.
3. Animals must be a beef breed (as outlined in Beef Breeding section).

Division 002: MARKET HEIFERS

1. Exhibitor must have market heifer in possession by December 1st.
2. Market Heifers will show with the Beef Steers.
3. Grand Champion Overall market heifer will sell in the Livestock Sale and be slaughtered.
4. Market Heifers may not be shown as a Breeding Heifer.
5. Market Heifers will sell with the Beef Steers in the Livestock Sale, if chosen by the exhibitor.

Division 003: SLICK STEERS

1. Beef Steers/Market Heifers entered must have a hair length of ¼ inch when they arrive on the Fairgrounds.
2. Hair length will be checked at weigh-ins and before the show. If hair is not cut to proper length at the time of weigh-in, it will be deemed ineligible for this class and will show in its respective breed class.
3. Animals entered in this class that wish to participate in the Born & Raised show, may do so if that show's eligibility requirements are met.

Division 004: BEEF FEEDER CALVES

1. Feeder calves can be either a steer or heifer.
2. Feeder calves must be born between January 1st and May 1st of the current year.
3. Feeder calves must show characteristics of a beef breed, as outlined in the Beef Breeding Section.
4. Feeder calves will be tagged on the 2nd Saturday of May at the Fairgrounds between 8:30 – 10:30am.
5. Feeder calves must be weaned by June 1st.
6. Feeder calves must be dehorned prior to or at May tagging (if horns are longer than 1½ inches).
7. Feeder Calves must be castrated prior to or at May tagging.
8. Calves must receive one mandatory vaccination at tagging.
9. Feeder calves will be shown based on their weight.
10. Beef Feeder calves will not sell in the Livestock Sale, nor will the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion. Feeder calves will be permitted to go home at a designated time.

Division 005: BEEF BREEDING

1. Animals entered must be from one of the following:
Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, Crossbred, and Exotic (Charolais, Chianina, Limousine, Maine-Anjou, Simmental, Shorthorn Plus, plus other listed in the Beef Resource Handbook)
2. Classes will consist of the following:
Class 001: Junior Heifer Calf
Jan. 1st – Mar 31st, 2019
Class 002: Senior Heifer Calf
Sept. 1st – Dec 31st, 2018
Class 003: Late Summer Yearling
July 1st – Aug 31st, 2018
Class 004: Early Summer Yearling
May 1st – June 30th, 2018
Class 005: Late Junior Yearling
Mar 1st – April 30th, 2018
Class 006: Early Junior Yearling
Jan 1st – Feb 28th, 2018
Class 007: Senior Yearling
Sept 1st – Dec 31st, 2017
Class 008: Cow – Calf (must be in production)
3. All animals wishing to be entered in a purebred class must provide registration documents to be entered into that class. If registration paperwork is not provided, the animal will be entered as a crossbred animal.
4. All animals must have an ear tag, tattoo, or other form of identification at the time of entry. No pending identification will be accepted.

DAIRY STEER SHOWMANSHIP

1. Exhibitor must show their own Dairy Steer.
2. All ages will show together.

Division 006: DAIRY STEERS

1. Dairy Steers must be in exhibitor's possession by December 1st.
2. Dairy Steer must be from a purebred dairy breed or a crossbreed of a dairy purebred (Brown Swiss and Holstein).
3. Steers must be castrated by using mechanical or surgical means or must be certified by a Veterinarian and approved by the Fair Vet that the calf is a steer. Castration must be completed by tagging in December of calf is ineligible to exhibit at Fair.
4. Animals entered in this class must be a steer, no heifers.

Division 007: BORN & RAISED IN LO. CO. STEER SHOW

1. Show is open to Beef Steers only.
2. Animals must be born in Logan County and producer must be an active/paid member of the Logan County Cattle Association.
3. Exhibitor must be a Logan County Junior Fair exhibitor.
4. Exhibitor must also show in the Beef Steer Show.
5. Animals must check in during designated times and hip heights measured.
6. Classes will be broken by hip height.
7. Exhibitor with more than one steer in a class, another Junior Fair Beef exhibitor may show one of the steers.
8. A mandatory meeting for all Born & Raised exhibitors and at least one parent/guardian will be held in the Show Arena prior to the start of the show. Time will be announced during hip height measurement.
9. The top eight places will receive prizes and/or awards.
10. First place steers in each class will be eligible to compete for the Born & Raised Champion.
11. In the final drive, as a steer is selected and placed, the next placed steer in that class is eligible to take its place until the top eight places have been filled.

1. Steer must be Holstein (black/red) or Brown Swiss.
2. A \$20 entry fee will due at weigh-in
3. Exhibitors must show his/her own steer unless the exhibitor has two (2) animals entered in the same class.

Division 001: DAIRY FEEDER

ENTRY RULES

1. Must weigh 400-600 pounds at weigh-in. No reweighing. Calves not making weight are to be removed from the fairgrounds by 10:00pm.
2. Feeders must be Holstein (Black or Red) or Brown Swiss (State Fair dairy feeder breeds). Feeders determined not to be of this breed will not be tagged.
3. Exhibitors can tag up to three (3) animals and show two (2).

GENERAL RULES

1. Calves must be dehorned and surgically castrated by/or on May 11TH.
2. Calves will receive one vaccination at tagging.
3. Calves should be washed, clipped and shown dry. Exhibitors can use show sticks.
4. Projects will be grouped by 4-H/FFA clubs with gates on each end. No gates separating individual projects will be allowed.
5. Animals exhibited must be completely owned (as evidenced by a Bill of Sale) by exhibitor by May 1st.

DRESS CODE

1. Exhibitors will be required to wear long pants or jeans.
2. A collared shirt must be tucked in and stay tucked in at all times. A shirt with buttons can only have the top two (2) unbuttoned.
3. Shoe strings to be tied.
4. No hats worn by exhibitors in the show ring or sale ring.

SHOWMANSHIP

1. Open to Dairy Feeder exhibitors.
 - a. Junior – ages 8 - 11
 - b. Intermediate – ages 12 – 14
 - c. Senior – ages 15 – 19
2. Dairy Committee will determine the number of classes.

LIVESTOCK SALE

1. First-place calves must participate for Grand Champion. Calves in contention for Reserve Grand Champion may be pulled prior to Reserve Grand Champion announcement.

2. Actual condition of calf must be stated on the day of sale. Any calf not as represented will be removed from the grounds. General health on day of sale is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
3. Buyers cannot gift, donate or sell animals to exhibitors once they go through the Livestock Sale.
4. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will not be required to sell through the Livestock Sale. The Committee desires the exhibitor to return the following year. When sold through the livestock sale, you cannot bring that animal back to the Fair.
5. Show placings remain the same, regardless if the Grand and Reserve choose to sell.

Division 002: DAIRY CATTLE

ENTRY RULES

1. Dairy cattle must have an ear tag, tattoo or other identification by June 1. No pending registrations will be accepted.
2. The dates for computing ages will be the same by classes.
3. Exhibitor may have two (2) exhibits per class.
4. No freemartins allowed.
5. Two-year-old cows must have calved or showing signs of calving.
6. Cows over two (2) years-old must have calved previously.

GENERAL RULES

1. Animals must be registered in the exhibitor's name or owned in partnership with a parent provided the registration number of the animal(s) involved is on record at the Extension Office by June 1.
2. Animals must be in exhibitor's possession by May 1.
3. Entries must comply with state health regulations. Junior Fair dairy breeding animals not required to have health papers.

SHOW GUIDELINES

1. Order of Show: Showmanship: Junior, Senior; Holstein, Guernsey, Jersey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire.
2. Classes will have grade and registered cattle showing together.
3. Two or more animals of the same breed will be shown by breed.

GENERAL RULES

1. The administration of any drug affecting the central nervous system (stimulant or depressant) of a horse is strictly prohibited. Any horse can be tested.
2. The drug phenylbutazone or its derivatives are allowed if a veterinarian's certificate prescribing the drug is on file with the Horse Committee prior to showing. Positive test results for phenylbutazone without a certificate means disqualification and forfeiture of all winnings.
3. Exhibitors and at least one advisor of horse exhibitors is required to attend a Mandatory Equine Education (MEE) session to be eligible to show at the Logan County Fair. Failure to attend disables an exhibitor from participating in PAS or royalty but may participate in club activities. Parents are encouraged to attend. Sessions will cover safety, equipment, arena ethics, dress requirements, Fair requirements and demonstrations of new classes.

Starting 2010 and continuing in the future, any member that has attended one or more MEE sessions and is age 12 or older may (Test Out). This testing out session will occur 1 hour prior to the first MEE session. The members will be required to take a written test and a hand on skill portion. Once the member has successfully completed the testing out portion it will be good for 3 years. MEE sessions will take place at Marmon Valley Farm on March 9, from 10am-12noon with registration starting at 9:30am. Test Out will take place only on March 9 starting at 9:00am, must be registered by 9:00am. Last MEE will be on April 9, from 6:00-8:00pm, with registration starting at 5:30pm

4. Advisors must attend 80% of Horse Committee meetings for their group to be eligible to show at the Fair. Meetings are January thru October, 6:00pm at the Extension Office. Exhibitors are expected to assist with preparation of the PAS and Logan County Fair Horse Show.
5. The general Rules and Regulations as defined by the Logan County Agricultural Society and the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows will be enforced. For any violations refer to Section 31 of General Rules & Regulations.
6. Horses may only be ridden in designated areas. Walk only, except in warm-up or show arena. No horses will be permitted to free loughing in warm-up arena. Only exhibitors are permitted to handle and school their own horse (with exception of parental assistance or for safety reasons). If not obeyed, exhibitor forfeits right to show.
7. Sawdust and wood shavings may be used for bedding.
8. No horses permitted across the creek.
9. No riding crops except in English and Contesting classes.
10. Horses may be moved in on Friday after 8:00am. Club advisors are responsible to see that stalls are cleaned and disinfected on Sunday following Fun Day show.
11. Exhibitors must attend the horse skill-a-thon, Wednesday 11:00am -1:00pm or 6:00-8:00pm at the 4-H building.
12. A Body Condition Score of at least four (4) is required.
13. Exhibitors need to enter the Main Street gate and Exit Harding Gate.

ENTRY INFORMATION

1. The following paperwork is required for horse/pony and School Master classes and can be found at www.logan.osu.edu or at MEE sessions:
 - a. Liability Release form
 - b. Class registration form
 - c. Horse identification form – photo side view entire horse w/ markings
 - d. Pony measurement form. Needs completed annually if the pony is less than 7 years old and/or if no measurement form is on file.
 - e. Lease form dated on or before May 1st.
 - f. Horse Safety and Ethics training form – new horse exhibitors only
 - g. GREEN Fun Day class sign up
2. Ownership policies per the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows (pages 6-7) is enforced.

3. Horses/ponies must be owned by the exhibitor/exhibitor family or leased and available for use at all times and in possession by May 1, except foals born after May 1. No mount change after May 1. A lease form must be in place by possession date.
4. Hardship cases will be considered for horses with injury, illness or disease. A signed excuse must be provided by veterinarian and advisor to allow a replacement. Sale of a horse is not a hardship case.
5. A horse or pony may have no formal training 30 days prior to the first scheduled PAS show.
6. Production Class Information:
 - a. A foal born January 1 or later is eligible for the foal show. Purchased foals must in exhibitor's possession by May 1.
 - b. Any animal shown in the 2018 foal class may be shown in the yearling show. Stud foals may be shown in the weanling class, but not as a yearling.
 - c. Production classes are open to Junior Fair Exhibitors.
 - d. Mare and foal feeding, care and management records should be kept in the Saddle Horse Production Book. Yearling records will be kept in a separate Saddle Horse Production Book.
7. Eligibility to show in a pony class, pony must be measured prior to June 1, of current year except those greater than seven (7) years old and have measurement form on file. Measurement must be performed by a member of the Horse Council by June 1. Ponies not measured will show in horse classes.
8. Animal measurements are as follows:
 - a. Horses - over 58"
 - b. Large ponies - 54" to 58".
 - c. Medium ponies – 50" to 54".
 - d. Small ponies - 38" to 50".
 - e. Miniatures - 38" or less.
9. Exhibitors cannot show more than three (3) animals except for Dressage State entry. These shall be one foal one yearling and one show animal, or one production animal and two show animals. Exhibitor showing contesting only may register two (2) horses per contesting classes except Fun Day.
10. Only one horse per class on fun day.

STATE FAIR INFORMATION

1. Exhibitors may qualify to show at the Ohio State Fair every year but may qualify only one animal. Ohio State Fair participants will be selected using the PAS system. PAS show will be on Saturday, June 15 starting at 9:00am at the Fairgrounds.
2. Register online at the Ohio State Fair website.
3. Exhibitors interested in qualifying for the State Fair Judging Team should enter the Youth Horse Judging Contest at the OSU Horse Barn in June. The top four placings will represent Logan County.

- Exhibitors need to take project as a Logan County Fair project.

HEALTH INFORMATION

- Horses and ponies must have certification of vaccination on file at the Extension Office by July 1.
- Horses and ponies are required to have flu/rhino, EWT (Eastern Western Tetanus). The strangles vaccine is not required by recommended.
- Horses or ponies vaccinated August 1, 2018 to June 24, 2019 are permitted at the Fair, with Certificate of Vaccination.
- Weanlings and yearlings must have their first vaccination and a booster before June 24, 2019. A mare with weanling must have vaccinations during the same time.
- Animals not vaccinated in the last 4 years, must receive first vaccination and booster before June 24, 2019.
- The Certificate of Vaccination form is available at the Logan County Extension Office, Mandatory Equine Education, www.logan.osu or www.horse.osu.edu.

SHOW GUIDELINES & CLASS INFORMATION

- Walk trot class limited to 1st and 2nd year exhibitors who have never shown at a canter.
- Classes shall be divided as follows: Novice 1st - 3rd year exhibitor. After the third year, must show in Advanced Classes. State Fair exhibitors must show in Advanced Classes. Winners of Novice Horsemanship class with five (5) or more participants will move to the Advanced class. This pertains to the exhibitor, not the horse.
- Exhibitors riding or driving an equine at any activity must wear headgear that meets/or exceeds the ASTM Standards. Chin harness must be secured at all times. Helmets are required in the costume class.
- Highest in class standing receives a trophy regardless of grade.
- Exhibitors must participate in a showmanship class with at least one animal, unless they are showing strictly in the contesting classes which will go through a contesters inspection class. **This rule also applies to Fun Day classes.**
- While in the ring no assistance may be given to the exhibitor except the ringmaster or judge(s). Assistance from outside the arena will result in disqualification.
- Members must show their own projects. Projects CANNOT be switched.
- Fun Day Show - If the class involves remounting, feet must be in stirrups before taking off.
- Walk /Trot exhibitors are limited to walk/trot classes only.
- Exhibitors are not permitted to add classes after June 1st. Exhibitors may scratch a class at any time by notifying the Extension Office or, during the Fair, at the registration area located in the building next to the covered bleachers Friday prior to show. After show starts scratches need to be done at the announcer's stand.

- Exhibitors may show in both Trail in Hand and Riding Trail classes at the Logan County Fair. Exhibitors must show in one or the other at State Fair.

SCHOOL MASTER 4-H PROGRAM

- Exhibitor must use their lesson horses for Fair.
- Exhibitor must be working on a horse 4-H project book.
- Exhibitor must complete Fair registration, liability release and school master agreement forms and return to the Extension office by June 1.
- Exhibitor may participate in Fun Day classes at the discretion of the advisor.
- Exhibitor must be enrolled in formal riding lessons at least 12 weeks prior to the Fair
- Participants must work with the lesson horse at least twice per week.
- Participants must assist in preparing the horse if showing at the Fair.
- Pony measurements not required if only in School Master Classes.

HORSE SAFETY & ETHICS WORKSHOP:

- Exhibitors and parent/guardian must have read the book "Horses, Safety and You - How to work with and around a horse safely", and viewed the two videos; Every Time, Every Ride and Horses, and Kids and Ethics at least once.
- The exhibitor must be at the gate when the class is scheduled to start. There will be a two-minute gate call after first exhibitor enters. The only exception is if there is a tack change.

1. Exhibition animals shall be free from all communicable and contagious diseases, including but not limited to caseous lymphadenitis (abscesses), contagious ecthyma (sore mouth), foot rot, ring worm, and pink eye.
2. A lease form is available for a first-year exhibitor taking a breeding animal only to see if the interest warrants. After one year the exhibitor must have their own stock.
3. Dairy and market goats must be dehorned prior to entry deadline.
4. All goats (including pygmies) must have a valid USDA approved Scrapie ID in the form of matching ear tattoo with registration papers, USDA ear tag, USDA ear tattoo code, or microchip.
5. Registration papers must be presented Monday, July 9 at the Junior Fair Show Arena Office between 7:30 – 8:00pm

DRESS CODE

1. Dairy goat exhibitors are required to wear white clothes.
2. Exhibitors participating in showmanship may wear regular show/sell dress code attire.
3. Exhibitors will be required to wear long pants or jeans.
4. A collared sleeve or sleeveless shirt must be long enough to be tucked in and stay tucked in at all times.
5. A shirt with buttons can only have the top two (2) unbuttoned.
6. Shoes with strings are to be tied.

ENTRY RULES

1. Birds must be entered in the proper Division and Class or they will be disqualified. Please include Department #, Division #, Class # (if applicable) of the entries and the number in each class up to four (4).
2. All birds, except commercial meat birds, must be owned and in possession of the exhibitor by May 1st.
3. Approximate hatch dates must be filled in on all birds except for meat pen birds.
4. No late entries.
5. No replacement or substitution.

GENERAL RULES

1. **Birds must be tested for pullorum.** A copy of the testing must be submitted to the Poultry Committee the day of Fair check in. NPIP papers must be submitted on all hatchery purchased birds including meat pens. Testing dates for Pullorum will take place the last week of June.
2. Birds entered must be recognized by the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection. **NO CROSS BREED OR HATCHERY HYBRID BIRDS WILL BE ALLOWED.** Section 5 Commercial Meat type may be cross breed hybrids. Examples of cross hybrid birds are as follows but are not limited to: Sex Links, Cinnamon Queens, Layorcas, Cherry Eggers, Golden Comets, Austra Whites.
3. Birds will go through vet check once they are in their designated pens, after weigh-in.
4. Birds must be clean upon arrival. Any bird found dirty will not be allowed in the barn area.
5. Birds must be free of internal or external parasites and infectious or contagious diseases otherwise they will be tagged and sent home immediately. The poultry committee will inspect all birds after weigh-in.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their own pens before 10:00am every morning. Birds and their pens must be kept clean at all times. Dirty pens, will be tagged with a RED CARD. Two (2) red cards may result in disciplinary action up to expulsion from the Fair.
7. Birds must have plenty of fresh food and water at all times. Food and water containers must be suitable in size for each pen. Containers too large will be replaced with a suitable container by the poultry committee. Birds must be able to move freely.
8. Entries not coming to the Fair must be reported to Tylor Murray 10 days prior to the Fair.

SHOW GUIDELINES

1. On the day of judging ONLY Junior Fair exhibitors will be allowed in the judging area. No adults will be allowed in the judging area with the exception of the poultry committee, the judge, or junior and Senior Fair board members. Exhibitors may help each other to and from the show area.
2. On the day of the show the poultry barn will be closed to the public during the show. Exhibitors must take their birds to and from the show through the rear door of the poultry barn.

DRESS CODE

1. Long pants or jeans (preferably black), free of holes or tears, is required.
2. Dress type shirt long enough to be tucked in is required. Polo or button-down shirt is suggested. All buttons, except the top two, must be buttoned at all times.
3. Long-sleeved, lab coats may be worn, but must be free of writing or graphics.

SHOWMANSHIP

1. Classes will be divided into three (3) categories.
 - a. Junior - age 8 to 12
 - b. Intermediate – age 13 to 15

2. Entry may consist of one: pullet, cockerel, hen, or cock.

4. Exhibitors may enter four (4) entries in Division 1

Division 002: ASIATIC LARGE FOWL

1. Breeds for this class are as follows: Cochins (Any variety), Langshans (Any variety), and Brahamas (Any variety)
2. Entry may consist of one: pullet, cockerel, hen, or cock
3. NO BANTAM BREEDS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THIS SECTION.
4. Exhibitor may enter four (4) entries in Division 2.

Division 003: ENGLISH LARGE FOWL

1. Breeds are as follows, BUT NOT limited to: Orpingtons, Australorps, Cornish, Dorkings, etc.
2. Entry may consist of one: pullet, cockerel, hen, or cock
3. NO BANTAMS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THIS SECTION.
4. Exhibitor may enter four (4) entries in Division 3.

Division 004: ALL OTHER VARIETY LARGE FOWL

1. Breeds are as follows, BUT NOT limited to: Americana, Aracaunas, Hamburgs, Polish, Orpingtons, La Fleche, Houdans, Sultans, Cornish, Faverolles, Campines, Lakenvelders, Leghorns, Minorces, Anaconas, Andalusions, etc.
2. Refer to the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection for additional breeds for this class.
3. Entry may consist of one: pullet, cockerel, hen, or cock
4. NO BANTAM BREEDS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THIS SECTION.
5. Exhibitor may enter four (4) entries in Division 4.

Division 005: COMMERCIAL MEAT PEN (CORNISH X)

1. Meat pens must be bedded with wood shavings. No straw.
2. Birds must be in the possession of the exhibitor within 72 hours of being hatched.
3. Birds must be raised by the exhibitor.
4. Meat pens must consist of three (3) cockerels, three (3) pullets, or a combination of both.
5. Meat pens must weigh a minimum of five (5) pounds each and a maximum of seven and one half (7.5) pounds each.
6. There is no age or hatch date requirement.
7. Exhibitors may bring four (4) birds. The fourth bird may stay for the length of the Fair as an option.
8. **No reweighs allowed.**

GENERAL RULES

1. Rabbit projects must be in the exhibitor possession by May 1.
2. Breeding rabbits must be tattooed in the left ear ONLY by May 1st. Any rabbit not big enough to be tattooed will not be permitted to show. If tattoos are not legible or backwards, rabbit will be sent home. Rabbits must be tattooed by May 1st, except Meat Pens.
3. Rabbits will go through vet check once they are in their designated pens.
4. Cage locks are not permitted.
5. Exhibitors will carry own cases.
6. Diseased rabbits will be dismissed by the Fair vet and immediately removed from the Fairgrounds.
7. No substitutions.
8. Exhibitors are responsible for the general care, feeding and watering of rabbits.
9. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their own pens before 10:00am daily. If a pen is dirty it will be tagged with a RED CARD; 2 red cards may result in disciplinary action up to expulsion from the Fair.
10. Pens must be clean at release on Sunday. Failure to do so may result in disciplinary action up to expulsion from the Fair.

11. Animals removed prior to the release time will cause the exhibitor to lose current year's awards and may be barred from exhibiting in next year's Fair. Release time is 6:00am – 9:00am, Sunday. The rabbit committee is not responsible for any rabbits left in the barn after 9:00am.
12. Exhibitors should plan to participate in barn clean up after Fair.

ENTRY INFORMATION

1. Exhibitors may enter rabbits in any class(s) in Divisions 001, 002, & 003.
2. First (1st) year exhibitor may take a meat pen plus an adult rabbit of the same breed for a total of 4 rabbits.
 - a. One (1) adult meat type rabbit and three 3 rabbits from the meat pen
 - b. If not taking a meat pen, exhibitor can take 2 rabbits from Divisions 001, 002, & 003.
3. Second (2nd) year exhibitor may take 2 rabbits plus a meat pen.
 - a. One (1) of the meat pen must be an adult.
 - b. If not taking a meat pen, exhibitor may take 2 rabbits from Divisions 001, 002, & 003.
4. Third (3rd) year exhibitor may take 4 rabbits plus a meat pen.
 - a. One (1) of the meat pen must be an adult.
 - b. If not taking a meat pen, exhibitor may take 3 rabbits from Divisions 001, 002, & 003.
1. Fourth (4th) year exhibitor may take 6 rabbits plus a meat pen.
 - a. One (1) of meat pen must be an adult.
 - b. If not taking a meat pen, exhibitors may take 5 rabbits from Divisions 001, 002, & 003.
5. Fifth (5th) year exhibitors may take 8 rabbits plus a meat pen.
 - a. One (1) of the meat pen must be an adult.
 - b. If not taking a meat pen, exhibitor may take 9 rabbits from Divisions 001, 002, & 003.
6. Divisions 001 & 002 with 3 or more exhibitors entered in the same Class will show in that Class. If less than 3 entries, the exhibitor will show in the "Other Purebred Commercial" or "Other Purebred Fancy" class.
7. First-place rabbits in Divisions 001, 002, & 003 will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion in their Division.

DRESS CODE

1. Exhibitor must wear black or dark blue pants (no holes or bleach).
2. Exhibitor must wear a collared, white shirt with long sleeves and long enough to tuck into pants. If a button-up, only the top 2 buttons may be unbuttoned.
3. Plain white lab coats without writing or graphics will be allowed.
4. Shoe strings are to be tied.
5. No hats in the show/sale ring.

SHOWMANSHIP

1. Rabbit exhibitors are eligible to participate.

Division 004: MEAT PEN**ENTRY RULES**

1. Meat pen rabbits must weigh at least three (3) pounds but not more than five and a half (5 ½) pounds each.
2. Exhibitor may weigh-in up to 5 rabbits and exhibit the best three. The remaining 2 may be taken home or 1 may stay for the fryer class, provided they make weight.
3. Rabbits that are under/over weight will be sent home.
4. Meat pens will be judged on meat type, conformation and uniformity of the three rabbits.

GENERAL RULES

1. A meat pen consists of three rabbits of the same breed from Division 001.
2. If an exhibitor is taking a meat pen, one of their allowed number of rabbits must be of the same breed.
3. Meat pen rabbits will be assigned a Logan County Fair tattoo number during weigh-in. Rabbit with previous tattoo will not be permitted to show.
4. Exhibitors must raise (not buy) their meat pen within the current year.

LIVESTOCK SALE

Division 005: SINGLE FRYER**General Rules**

1. One of the allowed number of rabbits must be of the same breed.
